The "hive-minds" can all agree that they are extremely excited to see the marching band win a competition. "The fact that we are a 3rd-year band competing in Mid-States is AMAZING!" Bosch stated. In case you

haven't been keeping up with the marching band, at just the first competition of the season, the Marching Highlanders scored 4th overall, just a matter of points behind bands who have been competing much longer.

The marching band has changed tremendously over the past couple of years. The shift from a new, timid, competitive marching band to one that's "ready take on the competitive marching world," according to Bosch, in such a short amount of time is insane, and it all has to do with attitude. Coming Out to Homecoming



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

Are you fresh out of ideas on things to do with your partner this fall? If so, here's The Tartan's Top 10 ideas on what to do this leafy season:


1. Skin care- Sweating all day long at school is definitely not doing anyone's skin a favor. Target has a whole rack of skin care essentials now, so take advantage!


